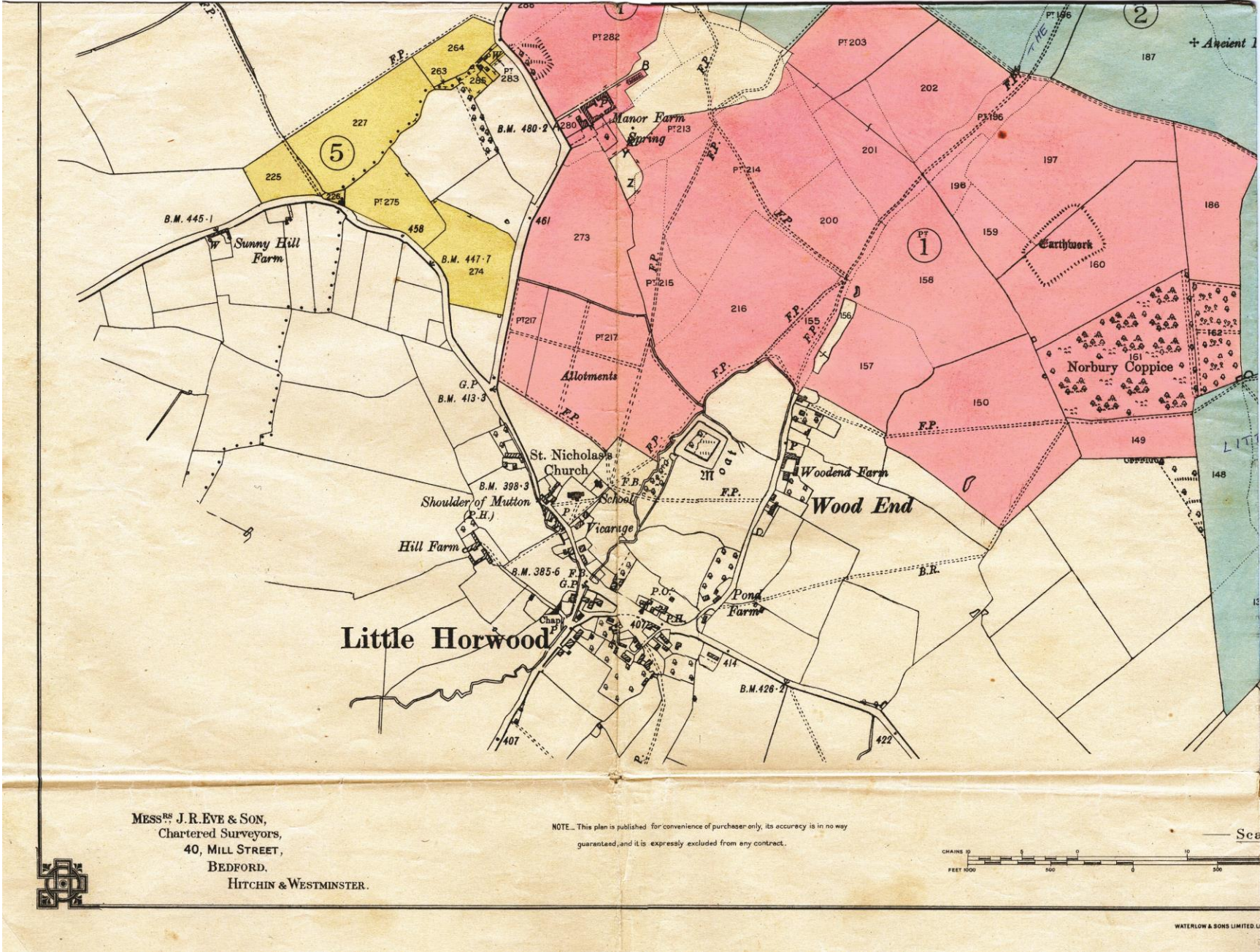

1943 The House of Lords

- The Archbishop of York
 - The bells of 12000 Parishes have been silent for three years now except for the celebration of victory in Egypt
 - The bells must be rung again now that fear of invasion has passed
- (In Wartime bells were only to be rung as a warning that invasion had commenced)

1943 Little Horwood

- The biggest funeral St Nicholas Little Horwood has ever seen but without bells
- Attended by Italian Prisoners of War
- Land Girls
- Numerous War Agricultural Committees
- Whaddon Chase Hunt representatives
- Directors of Gee Walker and Slater in Derby and London
- National Pig breeders associations
- Chief Constable of Bucks and others in Society too numerous to mention

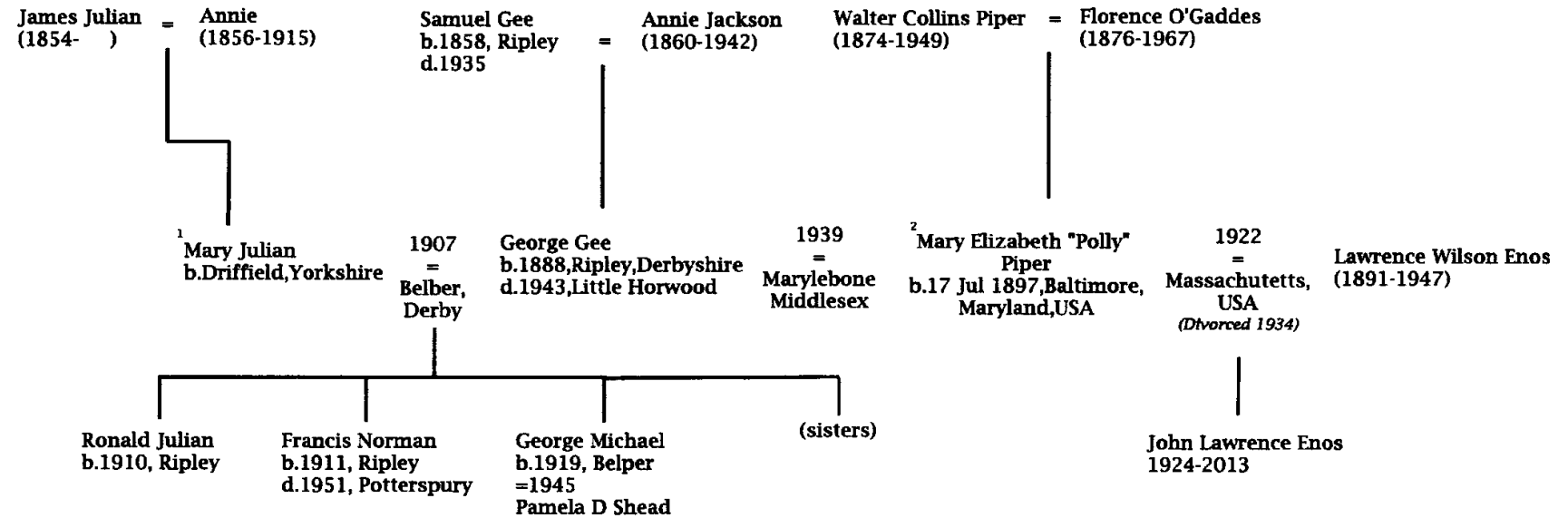

The Adam Brothers and the Embankment

When the Adam Brothers developed Covent Garden and the Embankment and the Adelphi Theatre it almost bankrupted them

In the 1930's the properties leading down to the Thames were slipping in towards the River.

George Gee had developed Hackney Marshes and was a master of Pile Driving to secure buildings, he had many developments in Leicester Square and other places to his credit.

I did a walking tour with Historic Houses experts to confirm that The Adelphi had been rebuilt as well as other buildings in the 30's and Pile driving had taken place to secure the buildings.

Back at Little Horwood it emerged that someone had bought one of the Manor Houses for £250,000 and sold an Adam Fireplace for £250,000

1937-1938 George Gee hired the White House
Little Horwood as a hunting lodge for the season
with the Whaddon Chase Hunt



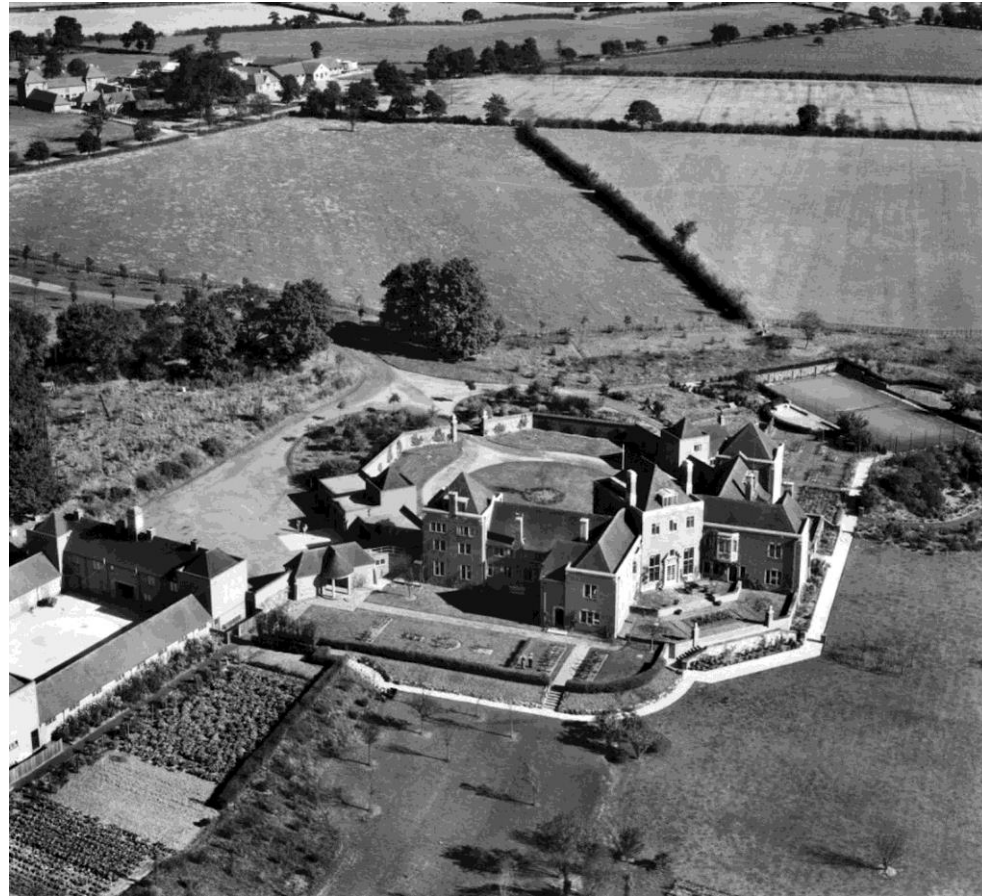
Gee bought over 1000 acres in Little Horwood and Creslow near Whitchurch and Wakefield at Paulespury on the A5

- State of the Art modern dairy milking parlours
- 3000 pigs
- He made a £1000 bet with Lord Rothschild that he would have a Manor House built and living in by the start of the following hunting season.
- Huge brick orders bound for London were diverted from Calvert brickworks via Swanbourne Station and Little Horwood.
- His Mansion had substantial stables later used as a base for Little Horwood Home Guard .
- Manor Farm had many buildings erected to be occupied by the Army Signals units (An outpost of Whaddon and Bletchley Park and on the payroll of MI6)

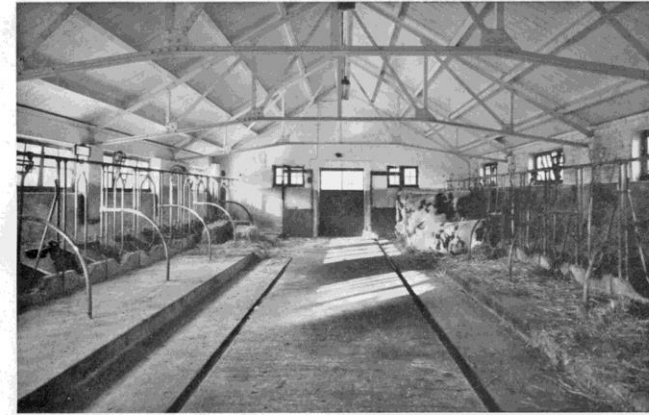

The Estate Office for the whole Estate of a number of Farms and behind the Granary where corn was lifted by a belt shaft up into the Silos for storage

Below the automatic milking parlour where cows were brought in from the main shed and milk automatically put through a cooler into the churns which were stored in a large walk in fridge

George Gee then built the airfield

- Land was requisitioned from the Bull family and others
- Existing crops were bulldozed and hedgerows flattened
- Train loads of rubble from London bomb damage sites were brought via Swanbourne station as foundations
- Supplies came from RAF Bicester via Swanbourne Station
- The airfield was mainly a training facility but many Wellington Bombers took part in large bombing raids.
- The gliders that the Oxon & Bucks infantry used to take Pegasus Bridge 6 hours before the D-Day landings were trialled here and frightened Ted Bull to death as they crash landed.

The Address by Reverend Guy Tearle Chaplain to the forces from St Nicholas Church Pulpit

- I have known George for 25 years
- George was a tremendous realist who was absolutely free from all selfish pettiness and selfish sham
- He intensely disliked fulsome flattery or extravagant eulogy
- A figure of tremendous personality and vitality whom God had given a brain as clear as crystal
- Many knew him for his genius as a captain of industry and a builder and architect, his grasp of public affairs and his generous support to agricultural science

Guy Tearle's Eulogy

- A big man in body , intellect and outlook ,free from that spirit of contempt which some men showed for men who were not so well endowed as they.
- He had a great sense of humour and his laughter was infectious but never in any circumstances had he heard him tell a lewd joke.
- His youngest son Flight Lieutenant George Michael Gee had been taken prisoner in April 1942 and could not be at his fathers funeral.
- (He subsequently escaped and after some 15 months behind enemy lines reached the Allied lines in Italy in December 1944)

The Sad Aftermath

- Georges elder son and executor Francis Norman Gee of Wakefield Lawn Potterspury had married Sheila Jackson-Stopps at St Georges , Hanover Square.
- Was Master of The Grafton Hunt and hunted with the Whaddon Chase
- Was found shot dead in woods on his Estate in Potterspury.
- Also had his funeral in Little Horwood in 1951 and is buried with his father under the Manor Stone memorial in Little Horwood Churchyard.
- His middle son Ronald Gee at Creslow also shot himself in 1953. Huge police searches with dogs and dragging ponds took place before he was found in the middle of a Stuke of straw. He is buried at Hoggaston.
